

SAN FRANCISCO SANCTUARY CITY ORDINANCE AND PARKS.

- In 1989, San Francisco passed the "City and County of Refuge" Ordinance (also known as the Sanctuary Ordinance). The Sanctuary Ordinance generally prohibits City employees from using City funds or resources to assist Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) in the enforcement of Federal immigration law unless such assistance is required by federal or state law.
- In 2013, San Francisco passed the "Due Process for All" Ordinance. This ordinance limits when City law enforcement officers may give ICE advance notice of a person's release from local jail. It also prohibits cooperation with ICE detainer requests, sometimes referred to as "ICE holds."

RECREATION AND PARK DEPARTMENT: PARK RANGERS.

- Duties and Responsibilities:
 - Maintain and Enforce San Francisco Park Code
 - Parking Enforcement / Citations
 - Community Outreach and Education
 - Medical Emergencies / First Aid
 - Handle Dynamic Situations
 - Earthquake / Fire / General Emergencies
 - Emergency Preparedness / Training
 - Liaison with San Francisco Police Department and Fire Department
 - Lost and Found
 - General Public Relations
- San Francisco Park Rangers are not sworn peace-officers, they are unarmed, and they issue citations.

WHAT THIS MEANS.

- The San Francisco Recreation and Park Department fully complies with the City's Sanctuary City ordinance, also known as the City and County of Refuge Ordinance.
- The San Francisco Recreation and Park Department:
 - Does not require any information related to the immigration status of an individual for any programming or recreational activities, classes, or stewardship opportunities. (Per SF Admin Code Sec 12H.2 Sec d.)
 - Under current law, and last amended in July 2016, City employees may not use City resources to:
 - Assist or cooperate with any ICE investigation, detention, or arrest relating to alleged violations of the civil provisions of federal immigration law.
 - Ask about immigration status on any application for City benefits, services, or opportunities, except as required by federal or state statute, regulation, or court decision.
 - Limit City services or benefits based on immigration status, unless required by federal or state statute or regulation, public assistance criteria, or court decision.
